Through September 2020 U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Brownfields Assessment Grant funding will be available for Phase I and II Environmental Site Assessments (ESAs), hazardous building materials surveys, cleanup planning, and a variety of redevelopment planning activities in Ontario, Vale, Nyssa and Malheur County. While the grant funds cannot be used for cleanup or construction/renovation/demolition, they can be used to evaluate property cleanup and redevelopment options and whether other sources of funding may be available.
